EXAMINATIONS

There will be two examinations: a midterm examination and a final examination. The midterm examination will be written in class on Tuesday, October 16; the final examination will be written during the examination period at the time and place designated by the Registrar. You must be available to write your final exam at any scheduled time during the official exam period.

The final examination will not be cumulative in the sense that it will focus on only those lectures covered after the midterm examination. However, there will be a major essay on the final examination that will require integration of the entire course.

The midterm examination will be 80 minutes in duration. The final examination will be 120 minutes in duration. Both examinations will be composed of multiple-choice questions, fill-in-blanks questions, and essay questions.

If you encounter what you believe to be a faulty question on an exam, answer it to the best of your ability under the circumstances, and write a brief explanation of "the suspected problem" on the front of your examination. Occasionally, bonus marks are awarded to those who spot subtle ambiguities or errors in the questions. Note that the instruction on the multiple-choice questions is always to "select the single best response."

Details about each examination (number and types of questions) will be presented at the beginning of the last lecture before each examination. After the final lecture before each exam, there will be an optional tutorial class during the scheduled class period. These tutorials provide students with an opportunity to ask questions about the course material—if you have no questions, there is no need for you to attend. There will be no discussion of the examinations during these tutorial classes.

PARTICIPATION BONUS MARKS

Students have the opportunity to earn up to two bonus marks (2%) by participating as subjects in psychology experiments. Those students who are registered in psychology courses that offer bonus marks for participation should go to the following web address: http://hsp.psych.ubc.ca
There, students initially request a HSP user account using the self-creation tool. Then, they can log in to browse available time slots, sign up for particular experiments, and confirm their accumulated bonus marks.

REPORTING OF GRADES

Once the midterm examination has been marked, the grades will be posted with student numbers (no names) on the bulletin board in the atrium of the main floor of the Kenny Building (2136 West Mall), which houses the Psychology Department.

You are encouraged to review your midterm examination results with your teaching assistant. Requests for the adjustment of a grade on the midterm exam must be made within 4 weeks of the posting of the grades. Most requests for adjustment of grades can be settled directly with your teaching assistant. In cases of a dispute that cannot be satisfactorily resolved in this fashion, Dr. Pinel will render a final decision.

It is a university regulation that students may <u>not</u> view their final examinations without special written permission from the Dean's Office(see page 46 of the UBC Calendar)--during this viewing, discussion of grades is strictly forbidden. If you believe that an error has been made in the marking of your final examination, you may officially request from the Registrar's Office (within 4 weeks of the announcement of the final grades) that your examination be remarked.
