Course Description: Orientation to psychological research, with special emphasis on ongoing research within the department; effective presentation of research findings, oral & written; critical evaluation of research. Students carry out a research project and report on its development during seminars. Students also discuss research by Departmental staff, with emphasis on choice of problems, research design and data analysis.

Prerequisites and/or Course Restrictions: Restricted to students in the Honours Programme in Psychology. See Professor Don Wilkie about applying to the Honours Programme..

Format of the course: The class involves placement in a laboratory in the Department of Psychology, where students conduct a research project. Class meetings are held in a seminar format, with the focus on practical research skills and interaction. This course involves exposure to a wide variety of research within psychology. Attendance at departmental colloquia and reading journal club articles are expected activities in preparation for class discussion.

Research Paper: Students are required to produce a written product of their research. This should be an APA-style manuscript suitable for submission as a journal article. The paper is due on **April 21, 2008**. The paper must be typed and must be turned in as a hard copy; e-mail will not be accepted. The grade for the paper will be derived from three independent markers; Don.

Amanda, and the supervisor of your project. Note that there is an award given in the department each year for the best 449 Honours Paper (the Morris Belkin Prize).

<u>PSA Conference Presentation</u>: Students are required to produce a conference presentation of their research. The PSA Undergraduate Conference is held in the spring of each year. Third year students will produce a poster based on the research conducted for this course. Fourth year students will give a formal talk at the conference based on research conducted for this course. The grade for the presentation will be derived from evaluations by Don, Amanda, and the members of the class.

<u>Class Presentation</u>: At some point during the academic year, students are required to give a 10 minute talk in class. The primary purpose of this talk (other than developing presentation skills) is to explain the nature of their research project to the class, clearly and succinctly.

Course Policies
